In the summer, as usual we have many staff who are leaving to take up posts elsewhere and we have undertaken proactive recruitment that has seen us able to employ some very good staff as replacements.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their many contributions to Cooper School over the years and wish them well in their future careers. We will miss them.

Those staff *joining* us are: Amanda Brown as part-time teacher of Maths; Daniel Burton as Head of History ; Megan Dee as i/c Cross-curricular ICT and teacher of ICT, RE and History; Lisa Hewitt as teacher of Geography; Jodie Dudridge as teacher of English; Charlotte Moss as teacher of English; Marie Fremont as teacher of MFL; Roselyn Atoyebi as teacher of Science; Graham Frogley from part-time to full-time teacher of DT with Cooper.

In addition we have made various internal appointments: Nicola Roddis as Head of ICT; Emma Simpson as Head of DT; Stephen Payne as 2 i/c DT; Andrew Hencken as Head of Year; Sandra Mussett i/c Applied Science development.

These appointments leave us in a very healthy position for the start of the new year with specialists in place in all areas. This is a great advantage and is a substantially better position than many local schools find themselves in.

Post-OFSTED Action Plan

Following our good inspection we generated a post-OFSTED action plan (POAP) for moving the school forward in the areas identified by the inspection team. The summary version of this plan has been issued to all parents, addressing the headline issues. If you did not receive one via your 'post person' and would like a copy please let Mrs Munro know.

Uniform Update

The OFSTED Inspection Report stated that the pupils' uniform was poorly adhered to and was detrimental to the image of the school, highlighting improvement in this area as one of our key issues. We had already been working with staff, students and parents on improving the uniform and, as we informed you, the new uniform becomes 'live' in September.

The full details of the new uniform, how it can be obtained, and information about a 'Saturday Shop' where you can pre-order your uniform at a discount, will be contained in a letter to you that we will be sending out by post to all parents of pupils in Years 7 to 10. This will ensure that all parents at least get a copy of the information. So that you can plan in advance, the detail of the 'Saturday Shop' on June 12 and how to pre-order the uniform are also included at the back of this newsletter. As we are sending this letter out by post we will also include additional information such as the uniform catalogue, the Newsletter and information about new data processing regulations.

The school itself will be purchasing a supply of uniform that will be used as one of the measures to ensure pupils' compliance with the new uniform in September. Reinforcement of the basics of uniform compliance will be reiterated and insisted upon this term as a precursor to September. The uniform is simple, cost-effective and not too onerous for pupils or parents to adhere to. I would encourage all parents to read the details on the new uniform and help us to improve the image of the pupils and the school by insisting on compliance by your children.

NEWS FROM THE TRENCHES

On Friday 26th March 2004, the majority of Year 9 set off for a trip to Ypres, Belgium. We visited the trench systems and museum at Hill 62/Sanctuary Wood, the Tyne Cot British Cemetery (the largest British cemetery in Europe) and the Menin Gate. We also spent time in Ypres town centre, experiencing Belgium cuisine (chocolate!), and in the French hypermarket practising our language skills. Students found the day a moving and exciting experience, as they will tell you in their own words:

‘My favourite part was the cemetery and Menin Gate because I got to see how many of my family were fighting in the war and died for our country.’

‘It made me think, when I looked at the graves, how lucky I am.’

‘The Menin Gate was the best monument ever built. The monuments had blood and sweat poured into them to try to make up for the loss of many soldiers.’

‘I learned that people our age died for our country.’

‘All those gravestones in perfect straight lines were amazing.’

‘I liked the trenches that were pitch black – they were fun but scary. I never really realised how many people died and I feel sorry for them.’

‘We got to run around and have fun.’

‘This experience made me think how dirty and smelly it must have been in the trenches.’

‘I was blown away by the number of white graves in the cemetery.’

‘I enjoyed the day and my favourite bit was the trenches. I now think that the First World War was horrible.’

‘It is amazing how many people’s bodies did not get found.’

‘The trenches were really muddy, spooky and small.’

‘The trenches were unbelievable: the tunnels were so cool!’

‘My favourite bit was when we went into the trenches and got covered in mud.’

‘It was moving and heart breaking when you saw the full effect of war and the devastation it caused and still causes.’

‘I was close to tears.’

‘You appreciate it more if you see it for yourself.’

‘I thought that the trenches were sooo amazing. Also I was very moved by the amount of graves there was and the amount of unknown people there was. The graves and the trenches made me think how hard it must have been for all the people involved in the First World War.’

‘It was really good that we got great bargains on the chocolate!’



I would like to thank all staff and parents involved – it was a very smooth operation thanks to your teamwork and the effort you put in! – and I am exceedingly grateful to the students. As one parent who went on the trip put it, you were a credit to the school, Year 9 – punctual, polite, mature, responsible, helpful, and great fun to be around. Well done!

STORIES FROM SHAKESPEARE

LUNCH PASSES

Parents are reminded that pupils wishing to leave school at lunchtime need to possess a lunch pass validating their absence from school. In the interests of health and safety pupils only have two options at lunchtime:

1. Remain in school to use the school cafeteria or bring a packed lunch.
2. Pupils wishing to go home for lunch must live close to the school and are not expected to be hanging around the streets or local shops.
 - Lunchtimes are 1:20pm – 2:10pm except Wednesdays – 12:20 – 1:10pm.
 - Lunch passes will only be issued for pupils who leave to go home.
 - It is essential we have an accurate record of where each pupil should be at lunchtime.
 - Pupils are not allowed out of school without the written permission of parents and subsequent issue of a lunch pass.
 - If your son/daughter needs such a lunch pass forms are available from school. Also a written note in the planner would be sufficient to obtain a lunch pass from the Lower School office.
 - Failure to show a lunch pass to staff on duty at the front gate will mean your son/daughter will not be permitted to leave school for lunch.

BACK GATE

- Pupils are reminded that the Back Gate to the school is locked during the day.
- Sanctions will be used against pupils climbing over the back gate at any time of the day.
- Often, pupils manage to leave the site when they are not permitted. Again, sanctions will be used when they are found to have been off site without permission.

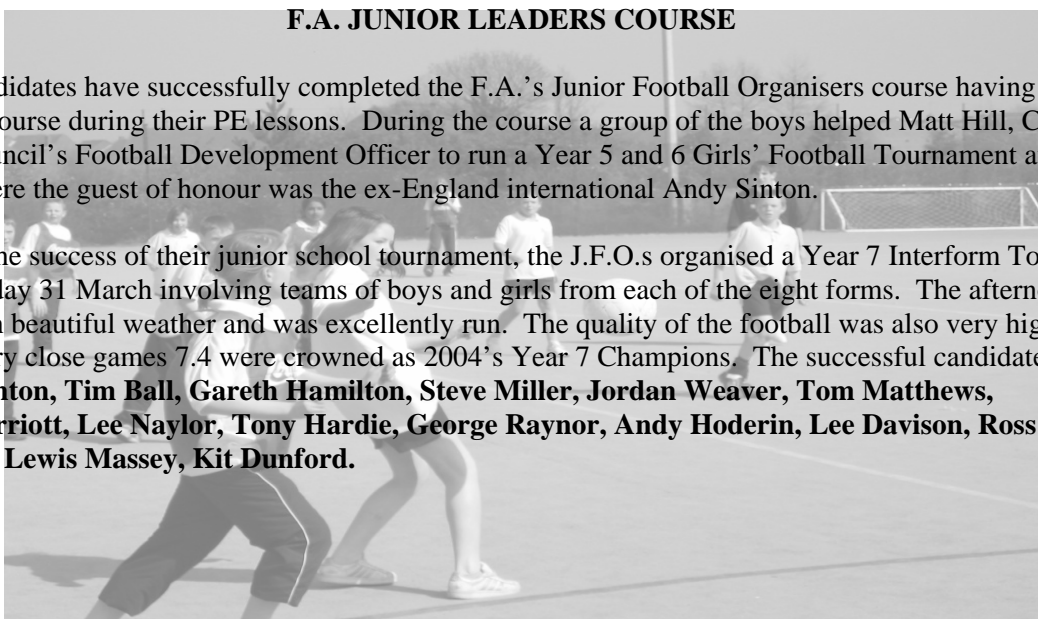

CURRICULUM ENHANCEMENT 2004



In a tradition dating back to 1978 the school has tried to enhance the curriculum of Key Stage 3 pupils during the final week of the Summer term as an ongoing process of broadening their horizons and raising their expectations.

This year is no exception and an exciting three days are being planned of trips and on-site curriculum extension activities. Some 40 pupils are going to Germany to improve their language skills so the remaining 540 will take part in Curriculum Enhancement 2004 — **CE4**.

Year 9 will at the moment experience two trips to Longworth Outdoor Centre on the banks of the Thames at Marlow and possibly a London experience. Oxford United have offered places for 15 pupils.

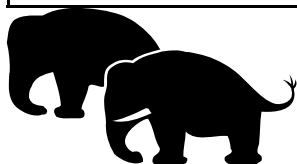
