## CURRICULUM ENHANCEMENT WEEK JULY 2003

Staff and students alike enjoyed an alternative take on the curriculum for three days at the end of last term when Year 7-9 were offered a vast range of choices from First Aid courses to wildly exciting watersports!

On Tuesday morning, coaches left school for London, Milton Keynes, Bristol and Portsmouth, starting a day filled with interactive games and simulations, logic puzzles, water rockets, crystal radios and sports as well as a luxurious cruise down the River Thames and a visit to the most spectacular aquarium in Europe. Activities ranged from climbing walls and blindfolded helicopter flying to windsurfing and dinghy sailing, and as always the students far exceeded their teachers: including utter humiliation in the climbing contest...

The following day saw a return of Cooper School to the Milton Keynes white water experience: they deserve a medal for surviving us for two days in a row! Oxford Brookes also welcomed us back after last year's successful visit and were very complimentary about the sportsmanship of our students as always. The week finished with a visit to Stratford-Upon-Avon, a trip to Thorpe Park and the annual Year 7 invasion of Warwick Castle. The students were very disappointed to find that they had no chance to put their teachers in the stocks and throw rotten tomatoes, but thoroughly enjoyed the climb to the top of Guy's Tower, a meeting with the castle ghost and the medieval torture chamber and dungeons.



Meanwhile, back at school, experts from around the county descended upon school to provide a range of memorable activities all round. Options included Body Shop makeovers, Technology design challenges, Street Dance and professional soccer coaching. Cooper School boasts plenty of its own experts and so students also benefited from First Aid courses, Drugs Awareness courses, Medieval and Tudor Madness days and the India Day from which students went home covered in henna and glitter!

The highlight of the week for many was the Hill End residential experience. Staff deserve a special mention for surviving three days of non-stop fun – including the long-awaited, never-to-be-forgotten night hike! Some students were brave enough to camp and all enjoyed a Swallows and Amazons adventure of a lifetime.

Huge and heartfelt thanks go to the staff who produced an amazing effort in the last week of term. ## Examination Results 2003

This year's series of examination results saw some exceptional individual sets of results and a very pleasing overall performance by the 217 Year 11 students from Cooper School in most subject areas. The results are a great credit to the students and their teaching staff who worked hard together to generate these results.

At 46%, the percentage of students attaining the benchmark of 5+ grades A\*-C is a very good improvement on last year's 42%, at a time when the results nationally have fallen. It is also the second highest set of results in the school's history. This is a just reward for the great efforts made by students and staff alike. The overall quality of these efforts can be assessed by the fact that 30%, almost 1 in 3 students, achieved 8 or more A\*-C passes.

Whilst these are very good and should be applauded, it is one of the school's aims to generate a face for success for all students, nurturing their talents. This is amply evidenced by this year's results where many students overcame real difficulties to get examination results of which they can be justifiably proud. 100% of students were entered for at least one examination with 97% achieving at least one grade A\*-G and 92% achieving 5 or more A\*-G grades.

Some of the outstanding individual sets of results which are worthy of mention include: Joe Stachowiak (10A\*/A), Jodie Thompson (9A\*/A), Chris Wagner and Michelle Caulfield (8A\*/A), and Alex Marsden (5A\*/A), all gaining these alongside other very high grades. The sheer quality of these results speaks for itself.

We would like to thank all our students for all their hard work and contributions to the life of the school during their time with us and wish them all well with their future careers.

**SCIENCE DEPARTMENT****Key Stage IV Science to challenge staff and pupils**

Pupils and staff will be challenged and refreshed by the undertaking of a new and exciting Double and Single Modular science course along with Applied Science for a selected group. There will be more frequent examinations leading to a final grade but the new format should appeal to more pupils.

**Science Extension Work**

The department is always keen to broaden the scientific experiences of pupils and sent some to Cranfield to attend a Science, Engineering and Technology Workshop and others to a Chemistry Camp at Birmingham University. Being treated like an adult really impressed **Kayleigh Collins (11.4)** who writes:

“From the 21<sup>-25</sup> July 2003 I attended a science, engineering and technology workshop. It was only for female students in Years 10 and 11. We stayed in the Madison Hotel in Swindon for the duration of the trip. I shared a room with the other person from our school, we were treated like adults, deciding when we went to bed and what time we got up! We slept and ate breakfast in the hotel and then went in a minibus to Cranfield University, which is a military site. We ate lunch and dinner in the officer’s mess, which is quite posh and very different to what I am used to. We had an hour and a half of free time where we could play pool or watch television. On the Wednesday night, Jackie the organiser, rented out a video for us, which we all watched in a big auditorium. I met lots of people, some of which I hope to stay in touch with. I think it is one of those experiences that I will remember for the rest of my life”.

**Charlotte Tuffrey (11.7)** and Kayleigh kept a daily diary which highlights just how exciting and worthwhile these experience are.

“On Monday we did a DNA workshop. We learnt how to obtain DNA and then we processed it and passed an electrical current through so that we could see the bands of the DNA. Later on that day we attended a mechanical engineering workshop where we took a lawnmower engine apart and put it back together and measured the efficiency, bore, stroke and sweep volume, torque and fuel consumption. We also went to an electronics workshop where we made a dice using L.E.D.’s and printed circuit boards.

On Tuesday we did a chemistry workshop where we looked at titration of strong and weak acids with a base. The removal of chlorinated metal dissolved in water by distillation and evaporation, determination of suspended solids in river water by filtration. After lunch we looked at the identification of chlorinated metal using flame coloured tests and the identification of unknown inks by chromatography. We were shown some demonstrations of the purification of water by charcoal, the interfacial polymerisation of nylon and flame photometry. Later in the evening we had a talk on the Army.

On Wednesday we attended a vehicle design workshop where we had to design a vehicle using materials supplied, build it and then race it against everyone else’s. After lunch we went to a civil engineering workshop where we had to strengthen a bridge across a ravine so that it would take the weight of a metal roller.

On Thursday we went to a materials workshop where we had to design and make a surfboard. We tested different structures and compounds to find their properties. We then designed our surfboards using the materials provided and then covered it in a fibreglass cover to make it waterproof. We then tested its stiffness and saw if it floated.

On Friday we attended a lunar rock analysis where we looked at moon rock and watched a video.

Throughout the week we had been working on a presentation within our syndicate. On Friday we had to present them to the other syndicates. I found the week fun and enjoyable. I also found it informative. During the week I made quite a lot of new friends from different schools and parts of the country”.


'A drugs free high' gives the opportunity for over 70 pupils from Cooper to rehearse for six months and perform on the national stage in Southampton.



### LIVE@COOPER 4

Following on from three previous concerts held at Cooper School, the showcase series continued with music teacher David Hall's most ambitious project so far, Live@Cooper 4. Twelve local bands provided more than nine hours of continuous music in the performance hall, (The Venue), and the lecture theatre, the alternative venue. Festival-goers wandered freely between the two halls, sampling some of the most diverse styles of music on offer in and around Bicester today.

First up on stage in The Venue with their version of *Let's Work Together* was the very able Bald Eagle Blues Band, featuring Sid Twynham on lead guitar. They were followed by heavy metallers, Ricochet, playing some of their own compositions and schools bands, Andensum and Soulproof. The musicians were supported by lighting engineers, who put on a thoroughly professional display of mood and laser effects to enhance the atmosphere.

If there had been a prize for showmanship, it would surely have gone to Wildfire's lead singer and guitarist Steve Hannah, who made a dramatic Rod Stewart-style entrance, stage right, with his dark glasses and scarf-draped microphone stand, and singing *American Woman*.

Miazma raised the volume once more with their own brand of punk before teacher band, Bop 'Til You Drop' wrapped up the proceedings with a memorable repertoire, which included the Beatles hit *Get Back* and the Moody Blues' version of *Nights in White Satin*.
